There will be adults and children wearing masks when I am outside of my home.



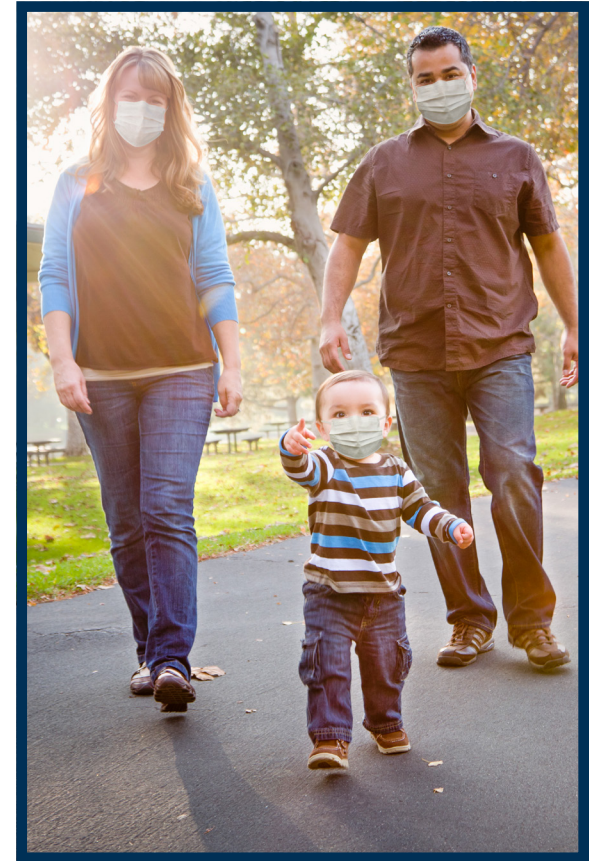
They are wearing the masks to keep their germs to themselves.
